PREFACE

This *Military and Overseas Voter Guide* has been designed to provide information to Illinois citizens who live overseas or are members of the United States Service, and will not be in their home county on Election Day.

Additional information can be obtained from either our Springfield office (217) 782-4141 or our Chicago office (312) 814-6440, or from your election authority (county clerk or board of election commissioners). A list of election authorities in Illinois is included at the end of this guide. This list and the contact information contained therein is current as of the date of publishing.

All citations contained herein refer to the Illinois Election Code, 10 ILCS 5/1-1, *et seq.*, unless otherwise indicated and are current as of the date of publishing. This guide may be amended to include new legislation and court decisions. Please visit the Illinois State Board of Elections' website (www.elections.il.gov) for any updates or follow us on social media to be notified when updated publications are released.

This guide is designed to assist United States service members and overseas voters with registering and requesting a ballot. It is not intended to be used as a substitute for relevant statutes, the Illinois Constitution, or applicable case law. Whenever there is a question regarding the interpretation of information contained in this guide, or of a particular Section of the Election Code or other statute, the individual should contact legal counsel.

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MILITARY AND OVERSEAS VOTING EMPOWERMENT ACT (MOVE)

Pursuant to the MOVE Act, certain Illinois citizens who live overseas or are members of the United States Service and will not be in their home county on Election Day have the option to choose the method of delivery for their vote by mail ballot. This means the voter can opt to have their ballot mailed, emailed, or faxed to them. They can also receive their ballot through their Illinois MOVE site account. These voters are often referred to as “UOCAVA voters”, in reference to the federal Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA).

A UOCAVA voter must sign their registration/ballot application and either mail, fax, or scan the signed application and email it back to the election authority before the request can be processed. No matter what method of delivery the UOCAVA voter chooses, all procedures for verifying the application will remain in place. (10 ILCS 5/20-4)

The MOVE Act requires State election officials to provide online access to registration and ballot request forms, electronic options for blank ballot delivery, downloadable write-in ballots in case of late ballot arrival, and voter status tracking services. (52 U.S.C. § 20302(e)-(f), (h)) This access is generally provided through the SBE’s MOVE website (move.elections.il.gov); though some jurisdictions will utilize the Board’s OmniBallot platform (<https://il.omniballot.us/sites/17/site/app/home>) or provide the same through their local support vendors.

FEDERAL POSTCARD APPLICATION (FPCA)

The [Federal Postcard Application](#) (FPCA) is a form provided by the U.S. Department of Defense to permit members of the United States Service, service members’ spouses, service members’ dependents of voting age, citizens of the United States who are temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States, and nonresident civilians to a vote by mail ballot and, if necessary, to register to vote. (32 C.F.R. § 233.6(b)(1)(iv)) This application may be submitted by email, fax, or mail to your election authority. (52 U.S.C. § 20302(f)(1)) [Click here](#) for the FPCA form.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETION OF THE FPCA

The FPCA form should be completed as follows:

- Block 1: Select the category of voter that describes you. Write or type your name (last, first, and middle), then enter your date of birth, and your valid Illinois Driver’s License or State ID number OR the last four digits of your social security number. If you do not possess either of these identification numbers, the State will assign a number that will identify you for voter registration purposes.
- Block 2: Enter the street address of your Illinois voting residence. This address must be within the county where you claim legal voting residence and where you (or your qualifying spouse/parent/guardian last resided in Illinois.
- Block 3: Enter the address where you want your ballot sent, usually where you live now. If you expect that the ballot will need to be forwarded to another address, you may also include that in the designated location on the FPCA.
- Block 4: Provide your contact information to allow your election authority to follow up if more information is required. If you are requesting your ballot through email or electronic transmission, please include a valid email address here. This block is optional.
- Block 5: Illinois allows you to receive the vote by mail ballot by mail, email, fax or electronic transmission. Electronic transmission is available through the SBE’s MOVE site, through the OmniBallot portal, or through your election authority’s designated vendor. Select the box indicating how you want to receive your ballot. To vote in primary elections, you must enter a

political party affiliation. Without a political party designation, you will only receive primary ballot with nonpartisan offices or public questions, if applicable in a given election. Political party affiliation is not required if only requesting vote by mail ballots for general elections.

- Block 6: This section is not required for Illinois voters. If you would like to further explain your voter information, registration, or your address, you can use this space to do so, or include anything that may assist the election authority in accepting the application.
- Block 7: Sign and date after reading the statement. No witness or notary is required. The Illinois Election Code allows for digitized signatures. We recommend providing a digitized signature that reproduces your actual signature and avoiding the use of a digitized token or typewritten digital fonts.

Once your FPCA is complete, submit it to your election authority by email, fax, mail, or, where available, electronically. Contact information for your election authority can be found [here](#) on the State Board of Elections' website.

MILITARY VOTERS & FAMILIES OF MILITARY VOTERS

Qualifications to Vote

- Be a United States citizen
- Be at least 17 years old by the date of a caucus, general primary election, or consolidated primary Election, and will be 18 by the following general election or consolidated election
- Not be registered to vote in another U.S. State or territory

(10 ILCS 5/3-1, 3-6)

Defining a Military Voter

A military voter is a member of the United States Service currently on active duty (10 ILCS 5/20-1), including:

- Family members or dependents of voting age accompanying the military voter
- Members of the U.S. Armed Forces, Merchant Marine, Commissioned Corps of the Public Health Service, and the National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration
- U.S. Government employees serving outside the U.S.

Defining Families of Military Voters

A family member of a military voter is a spouse or dependent who, by reason of active duty or service of the member, is absent from the place of residence where the spouse or dependent is otherwise qualified and registered to vote. A dependent is defined as a father, mother, brother, sister, son, or daughter. (10 ILCS 5/20-1(2) and (8))

Illinois law allows spouses and dependents of absent uniformed voters who have never resided in Illinois to vote in Illinois. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.3)

A family member (mother, father, sister, brother, husband, or wife) of the military voter may apply for a vote by mail ballot for such military voter as long as they are a registered voter in the election precinct for which the application is made. (10 ILCS 5/20-3)

Registering to Vote and Requesting a Vote by Mail Ballot

If you meet all of the qualifications to vote, you can register to vote and request a vote by mail ballot following the guidance below:

- Send an [FPCA](#) (or similar application form furnished by your election authority) to your [election authority](#) every year and whenever you change your mailing address. A request for a vote by mail ballot entitles the applicant to a vote by mail ballot for every election in that one calendar year; this includes all UOCAVA voters applying through the FPCA or MOVE. All FPCA's are valid for one calendar year. Therefore, if an election authority receives an FPCA on January 1, 2026, it will be valid until December 31, 2026.
- You can find election authorities' contact information [here](#) on the State Board of Elections' website or you may reference the list at the end of this guide which contains their addresses, phone numbers, and emails. To apply for a vote by mail ballot, the election authority must receive your FPCA or similar application form not later than 10 days before Election Day. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.3)
- Illinois law allows for a spouse or dependent (who is registered to vote) of the military member to register that person in lieu of the official postcard. (10 ILCS 5/20-3)
- You may create an account on the MOVE site to request a ballot.

Illinois law allows for military personnel and their families to register to vote and to apply for a vote by mail ballot at the same time. (10 ILCS 5/20-2, 20-3)

How Can Military Personnel Vote?

A military member on active duty (or who was on active duty at any time within 60 days prior to the election) may vote in-person at the designated polling place for their permanent residence on Election Day. Voter registration is not required. (10 ILCS 5/4-23, 5-29.01, 6-67.01)

If voting by mail, the ballot must be postmarked no later than Election Day and received by the election authority within 14 days following the election. (10 ILCS 5/19-8, 20-2)

How Can Military Families Vote?

A family member may vote in-person at the designated polling place of their permanent residence. If voting by mail, the ballot must be postmarked no later than Election Day and received by the election authority within 14 days following the election. (10 ILCS 5/19-8, 20-2)

Creating a MOVE Account

The SBE's MOVE site will enable you to set up a MOVE account to register to vote and request vote by mail ballots for upcoming Federal elections. This site will give you the ability to keep in contact with your election authority and to track the status of your application and ballot. Go to <https://move.elections.il.gov/> to create your account.

The following election jurisdictions utilize the SBE's [OmniBallot portal](#) for FPCA and ballot transmission: Cook County, City of Chicago, DuPage County, Lake County, Sangamon County, and Marshall County. OmniBallot does not require creating an account.

OVERSEAS VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

Category 1: Citizens of the United States Temporarily Residing Outside the Territorial Limits of the United States

Category 1 includes civilian citizens of the United States, their spouses, and dependents of voting age when residing with or accompanying them, who maintain a precinct residence in a county in Illinois and who intend to return to that residence. (10 ILCS 5/20-1(3))

Registering to Vote and Requesting a Vote by Mail Ballot for Category 1 Voters:

- Send an [FPCA](#) (or a similar form furnished by your election authority) to your election authority every calendar year and whenever you change your mailing address. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1)
- If you are an unregistered Illinois resident temporarily residing outside the U.S., the election authority must receive your FPCA (or similar form) not later than 30 days before the election in order for you to receive a ballot for local, State, and Federal offices. If your FPCA (or similar form) arrives less than 30 days, but not later than 10 days before the election, registration is waived, and the election authority will send you a ballot for **Federal offices only**. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1)
- You may create an account on the SBE's MOVE site, or where available, utilize the OmniBallot platform, to request a ballot.

Category 2: Non-Resident Civilian Citizens

Category 2 includes civilian citizens of the United States who reside outside the territorial limits of the United States, have maintained a precinct residence in a county in Illinois immediately prior to their departure from the United States, do not maintain a residence nor are registered to vote in any other State, and whose intent to return to Illinois is uncertain. (10 ILCS 5/20-1(4))

Registering to Vote and Requesting a Vote by Mail Ballot for Category 2 Voters:

- Send an [FPCA](#) (or a similar form furnished by your election authority) to your election authority every calendar year and whenever you change your mailing address. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.2)
- If you are an overseas non-resident civilian citizen otherwise qualified to vote in Illinois, you may make application to the election authority having jurisdiction over your precinct of former residence for a vote by mail ballot containing the **Federal offices only**. The application must be received not less than 10 days before a Federal Election. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.2)
- You may create an account on the SBE's MOVE site, or where available, utilize the OmniBallot platform, to request a ballot (see page 5 for instructions).

Illinois law requires that uniformed and overseas voters have had a previous address in Illinois and not be registered to vote in any other State. Illinois law allows uniformed and overseas voters to register to vote and to apply for a vote by mail ballot at the same time. Spouses and dependents of uniformed voters who have never resided in Illinois are also qualified to vote in Illinois elections. (10 ILCS 5/20-2, 20-2.1, 20-2.2, 20-2.3, 20-3)

GENERAL INFORMATION

Casting Your Vote

In order to be counted, the voted ballot must be postmarked no later than Election Day and received by the election authority within 14 days following the election. (10 ILCS 5/19-8, 20-2)

Election authorities shall, at least 46 days prior to the date of any election at which Federal officers are elected, and 45 days prior to any other regular election, have a sufficient number of ballots printed so that such ballots will be available for mailing 45 days prior to the date of the election to military and overseas voters who have applied for a ballot. (10 ILCS 5/16-5.01(a))

If ballots are not available by this date prior to the election, election authorities must mail to the voter a Special Write-In Vote by Mail Blank Ballot along with a list of candidates who have qualified to be on the ballot and all referenda for which the voter is qualified to vote. (10 ILCS 5/16-5.01(b))

Notary/Witness Requirements

There is no requirement that registration or voting materials be notarized or witnessed.

Electronic Transmission of FPCAs and Ballots

Pursuant to UOCAVA, FPCAs and ballots yet to be voted may be emailed, faxed, or mailed. (52 U.S.C. § 20303) However, in order for your ballot to be counted, the Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP) requires that a hard copy containing an original signature must be received by the election authority. (52 U.S.C. § 20302(a))

Late Registration

Voters engaged in the military or naval service of the United States at the time of the election, or those discharged within 60 days of an election who return to Illinois too late to register for the upcoming election are still entitled to vote in-person in that election. Registration is not required, but these voters must sign an affidavit. Voters who register through grace period registration must vote in the office of the election authority (or designated location) for that election. (10 ILCS 5/4-23, 4-50)

Where to Send the FPCA

Mail the completed FPCA (or similar form) to your election authority. Addresses and phone numbers for these election authorities can be found at the end of this document or [here](#) on the State Board of Elections' website.

CALENDAR

DATES GOVERNING THE GENERAL PRIMARY ELECTION MARCH 17, 2026

Friday, January 2, 2026:

- First day any voter who is a member of the United States Service, a service member's spouse, or a service member's dependent of voting age who expect to be absent from the voter's county of residence on Election Day to apply for an official ballot to the election authority having jurisdiction over their residence. Members of the Armed Forces may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2, 20-2.3, 20-3)
- First day for a citizen of the United States temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States who is not registered but otherwise qualified to vote and who expects to be absent from the voter's county of residence on Election Day to simultaneously apply to the election authority having jurisdiction over their precinct of residence for registration and a vote by mail ballot. Citizens of the United States may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1, 20-3)
- First day any nonresident civilian citizen, who is otherwise qualified to vote, to apply to the election authority having jurisdiction over their precinct of former residence for a vote by mail ballot containing the federal offices only. Nonresident citizens of the United States may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1, 20-3)

Friday, January 30, 2026:

- Last day for the election authority to have in the office of the election authority a sufficient number of ballots printed and available for mailing to members of the United States Service, service members' spouses, service members' dependents of voting age, citizens temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States, and nonresident civilians. (10 ILCS 5/7-16, 16-5.01) January 30, 2026, is the last business day to mail these ballots requested at least 45 days before the General Primary Election. (52 U.S.C. § 20302(a)(8)(A))

Tuesday, February 17, 2026:

- Last day for citizens of the United States temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States who are not registered, but otherwise qualified to vote, and who expect to be absent from their county of residence on Election Day to simultaneously apply to the election authority having jurisdiction over their precinct of residence for vote by mail registration and a vote by mail ballot.

For applications received after February 17, 2026 and before March 9, 2026, from a citizen temporarily residing outside the U.S., the voter registration requirement is waived, and the applicant will be eligible for a federal ballot only. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1, 20-3)

Monday, March 9, 2026:

- Last day for any voter who is a member of the United States Service, a service member's spouse, or a service member's dependent of voting age who expects to be absent from the voter's county of residence on Election Day to apply for an official ballot to the election authority having jurisdiction over their precinct residence and the last day for the election authority to mail such ballots. Members of the Armed Forces may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2, 20-2.3, 20-3)
- Last day for any nonresident civilian, otherwise qualified to vote, to apply for a vote by mail ballot containing federal offices only to the election authority having jurisdiction over their precinct of former residence, and the last day for election authority to mail such ballots. Nonresident civilians may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.2)
- Last day for the election authority to send an official ballot for federal offices only to citizens of the United States who are temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States who have applied for registration and/or a vote by mail ballot. Citizens temporarily residing outside the territorial limits may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1, 20-3)

DATES GOVERNING THE GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 2026**Friday, September 18, 2026:**

- Last day for the election authority to have in the office of the election authority a sufficient number of ballots printed and available for mailing to members of the United States service, service members' spouses, service members' dependents of voting age, citizens temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States, and nonresident civilians. (10 ILCS 5/16-5.01) September 18, 2026, is the last business day to mail ballots requested at least 45 days before the general election. (52 U.S.C. § 20302(a)(8)(a))

Monday, October 5, 2026:

- Last day for citizens of the United States temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States who are not registered, but otherwise qualified to vote, and who expect to be absent from their county of residence on election day to simultaneously apply to the election authority having jurisdiction over their precinct of residence for vote by mail registration and a vote by mail ballot and be eligible for a full ballot. Last day for the election authority to mail such a ballot. For applications received after October 5, 2026, and before October 26, 2026, from a citizen temporarily residing outside the U.S., the voter registration requirement is waived, and the applicant will be eligible for a federal ballot only. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1, 20-3)

Monday, October 26, 2026:

- Last day for any voter who is a member of the United States Service, a service member's spouse, or a service member's dependent of voting age who expects to be absent from the voter's county of residence on Election Day to apply for an official ballot to the election authority having jurisdiction over the precinct of residence and the last day for the election authority to mail such ballots. Members of the Armed Forces may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2, 20-2.3, 20-3)
- Last day for any nonresident civilian, otherwise qualified to vote, to apply for a vote by mail ballot containing federal offices only to the election authority having jurisdiction over their precinct of former residence, and the last day for the election authority to mail such ballots. Nonresident civilians may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.2)
- Last day for the election authority to send an official ballot for federal offices only to citizens of the United States who are temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States who have simultaneously applied for registration and a vote by mail ballot. Citizens temporarily residing outside the territorial limits may apply via facsimile machine or other method of electronic transmission. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1)

For applications received after October 5, 2026, and before October 26, 2026, from a citizen temporarily residing outside the U.S., the voter registration requirement is waived, and the applicant will be eligible for a federal ballot only. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1, 20-3)

Tuesday, November 3, 2026:

- Overseas voters may be able to use a Federal Write-in Absentee Ballot (FWAB) available through Voting Assistance Officers at military installations or at Embassies/Consulates. To be eligible for this ballot, a voter must:
 - 1) Be located overseas (including APO/FPO addresses);
 - 2) Apply for a regular ballot no earlier than January 2, 2026, and no later than October 5, 2026, from the office of the election authority that has jurisdiction over the precinct of their last residence in the United States; and,
 - 3) Not have received the requested regular State vote by mail ballot from the election authority.

The voted FWAB must be returned to the election authority by the close of the election on November 3, 2026, or by the 14th day following the election (November 17, 2026) if postmarked by Election Day.

This ballot serves as a backup to the regular ballot and is available from a unit Voting Assistance Officer, at the Embassies/Consulates, or at www.fvap.gov. (52 U.S.C. § 20303)

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Can I register to vote and request a vote by mail ballot at the same time?

Yes. For military and overseas voters, Illinois law allows you to register to vote and request a vote by mail ballot at the same time. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1, 20-2.2, 20-2.3, 20-3) If you are an unregistered Illinois resident temporarily residing outside the U.S., the election authority must receive your FPCA (or similar form) not later than 30 days before the election in order to receive a full ballot. (10 ILCS 5/20-2.1)

What is the Federal Postcard Application?

The Federal Postcard Application ([FPCA](#)) form serves as both an application to register to vote and an application for a vote by mail ballot. Page 18 contains a reproduction of the form.

Does the FPCA need a notary signature or a witness signature?

No.

How can I contact my election authority?

You can find their contact information [here](#) on the State Board of Elections' website.

I would like to vote, but don't know how. Where can I find assistance?

Specific information on applying and registering to vote is contained in the *Voting Assistance Guide* distributed by the Department of Defense. This guide is a very valuable resource for the military and overseas voter. You may obtain a PDF version of the *Voting Assistance Guide*, as well as other voting related information and links on the FVAP website, www.fvap.gov.

Where do I send my FPCA?

Email, fax, or mail your completed FPCA to your election authority.

Must I submit a separate application for each election?

Submission of the FPCA serves as a request to receive a ballot for every election in one calendar year. (10 ILCS 5/20-2, 20-2.1, 20-2.2)

Is online voting allowed in Illinois?

No.

Am I able to fax or email my completed ballot to the respective election authority?

No. In order for the ballot to be counted, a hard copy of the ballot, along with an original signature on the ballot envelope, must be mailed back to the election authority. (10 ILCS 5/20-4)

When mailing an FPCA or a voted ballot to my state or territory, do I have to pay postage?

Generally, all election-related materials are mailed postage-free from any APO or FPO mail facility, all U.S. embassies and consulates, and any post office in the U.S. You must pay postage if the materials are mailed from a non-U.S. postal facility. (52 U.S.C. § 20304(b)(4)) In addition, Illinois State law allows for return delivery of a ballot by a licensed motor carrier engaged in the delivery of property (e.g. UPS, FedEx). (10 ILCS 5/20-5) You will be responsible for any delivery costs they charge.

When is the best time to apply for a vote by mail ballot?

The Federal Voting Assistance Program recommends submitting the FPCA in January of each year. Be sure to notify your election authority of any change of address.

What is an election for Federal office?

An election for Federal office is any general, primary, or special election held solely or in part for the purpose of nominating, or electing any candidate for the office of President and Vice-President of the United States, United States Senator, Representative in Congress, delegates and alternate delegates to the national nominating convention, and candidates for the Presidential Preference Primary. (10 ILCS 5/20-1(6) and (7))

If I do not maintain a legal residence in the U.S., what is my “legal State of residence?”

Your “legal State of residence” for voting purposes is the State or territory where you last resided immediately prior to your departure from the United States. (52 U.S.C. § 20310(5)(C)) This right extends to overseas citizens even though they may not have property or other ties in their last State or territory. When completing the residence section of the FPCA, be sure to enter the entire mailing address of your last residence, including street or rural route number.

This information is necessary to place you in the proper voting district, ward, or precinct. Illinois allows family members of citizens temporarily residing overseas who are U.S. citizens and who have never resided in the U.S. to claim their parent’s Illinois residence as their own. (10 ILCS 5/20-1(3), 20-2.1)

Can I register or vote in-person at the embassy or consulate?

At the present time, there are no provisions for in-person voting or on-site registration to be conducted at U.S. embassies or consulates. U.S. embassy and consular officials will assist U.S. citizens in completing FPCA forms for their State and provide other voting by mail information. U.S. embassy and consulate locations also serve as a mailing point where FPCA forms and other election materials may be mailed back, postage paid, to your voting jurisdiction in the U.S.

May I register to vote online?

Anyone with a current Illinois driver’s license or State ID may register to vote online [here](#) on the State Board of Elections’ website.

Who is my State Senator? State Representative? Congressman? U.S. Senator?

Elected officials can be found by selecting the “Find My Elected Officials” button under the Information for Voters tab on the State Board of Elections’ website, www.elections.il.gov.
